The Early Years Kitchen Garden Project

Evaluation summary

About

Due to increasing interest from the early childhood education sector, the **Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Foundation** — with support and funding from The Ian Potter Foundation's Alec Prentice Sewell Gift — began work on a three-year project in 2017 to develop a kitchen garden program specifically for early childhood settings.

The project, known as the **Early Years Kitchen Garden Project**, aimed to adapt the Foundation's already successful kitchen garden program for primary schools so that children can dig into pleasurable food education as early in life as possible.

In 2020, the Foundation launched the **Kitchen Garden Program for Early Childhood** — incorporating a tailored package of professional development, resources and support services developed in collaboration with the early childhood sector — that aligns with frameworks and helps support national standards in early childhood education.



The Foundation has reached 306 early childhood services as at January 2020, but there are still over 10,000 more to reach. The Foundation needs investment to continue inspiring and supporting early childhood educators and service providers to deliver pleasurable food education.
